


Kids on Strike!, Susan Campbell Bartoletti






Essays, lists, poems and art explore the ways 33 best-selling authors and celebrity contributors have coped with and thrived in the face of mental illness




Sugar Changed the World, Marc Aronson






Traces the inspirational story of the Crispus Attucks High School Tigers basketball team and how they broke the color barrier in segregated 1950s Indiana to become state champions.




Uprooted: the Japanese American Experience During World War II, Albert Marrin







This is the true story of a city under siege: the triumph of bravery and defiance in the face of terrifying odds. It is also a look at the power and meaning of music in beleaguered lives




Flesh and Blood So Cheap, Albert Marrin




Sachiko: a Nagasaki Bomb Survivor's Story, Caren Barzelay Stelson


